Process: Base Budget vs. Program Enhancement

- · Departments were asked to present two budgets:
 - The first, a base or 'level-service' budget demonstrated how much it will cost the City to provide the same level of service in FY 2016 that it does in the current fiscal year
 - The second, identified program enhancements any new or additional staff, major expenses or small capital equipment, or new programs. For each enhancement, departments filled out a one-page form which documented the basic information of program enhancements both in a numeric and narrative format in priority order. All program enhancements requested are provided in the Appendices. All told, 169 enhancements totaling nearly \$17 million were submitted.

Process: Integration of Strategic Plan

- Departmental Budgets also have full integration of Frankin Forward the City's Strategic Plan and Performance Measures for the first time. These measures are organized in either Workload, Efficiency or Outcome Measures and are marked (where applicable) to the four themes of the strategic plan:

General Fund Revenues:

Local Sales Tax

- Budgeted to increase in 2015-2016 (\$30.7 million)
- Growth of 6.9% (\$1.98 million) from 2014-2015 budget, 3.4% increase compared to the 2014-2015 estimate
- Statewide estimate for growth is approximately 4.0% to 4.38%
- 51.3% of total general fund revenue

Property Tax

- Tax Rate remains at .4065 per \$100 of assessed valuation. No increase proposed for FY 2016
- City Property Tax rate increased last year, first increase since 1987
- Of tax rate, 37% allocated for general fund; 55% for debt service fund, 4% for Street Aid Fund and 4% for Capital Projects Fund
- · City of Franklin has the lowest property tax rate among Tennessee cities with a population of over 25,000 people
- The .03 per \$100 of assessed valuation added in the FY 2015 budget is maintained with half going to additional neighborhood street resurfacing and half going to capital investment funding.

Property Tax Revenue

 Of the \$14.7 million in 2016, \$1.3 million for the IDB, \$5.0 million is proposed for the General Fund, \$500,000 for the Capital Projects Fund and the Street Aid Fund each, and \$7.4 million for the Debt Service Fund.

Note: \$14.7 million is exclusive of supplemental pickups, prior year collections and uncollected revenue

Property vs. Sales Tax

- Sales Tax continues to outpace Property Tax collections 2:1
- In FY 2016, Sales Tax will comprise 51.3% of all General Fund Revenues, an increase from FY 2015

Changes in Personnel Expense

- 2.0% cost of living adjustment effective July 3, 2015. Fourth year of merit pay program
- Full review of City "Pay Plan" vs. the market. Targeted market adjustments across departments; primarily targeting positions related to Engineering.
- Net of 9 positions added: 5.5 in Parks, 1 in Police, 1 in BNS, 0.5 in Communications, and 1 in Stormwater
- Cost sharing structure of health insurance with employees continues with 85% turnover factor (pay + benefits) used
- Pension across all funds budgeted at less than \$3 million
- Elimination of all authorized positions which were vacant since beginning of recession.

Pension Plan Contributions

- Increase of roughly \$400,000, or 15.5% across all funds

- Bicentennial Park Pavilion Improvements, Carter Hill acquisition/development and ongoing park improvement projects

 - \$12.9 million proposed budget for FY 2016 (an increase of 5.2%)

Public Hearing

- Eric Stuckey related that as discussed at the Work Session, the Ordinance should be amended from R-3 zoning to R-2. The ordinance will move through this second reading, the third reading, and then sent back to the Planning Commission.
- Greg Gamble, representing the applicant, provided information Alderman McLendon requested at the last meeting. The applicant went back to staff and it was found that R-2 zoning works out well. The total area of the property is 2.2 acres. In the packet it states that the requested area to be rezoned is 1.98 acres with right-of-way dedication using the existing Carlisle alignment. With Option D less land is needed, and the land area of 2.08 acres allows no more than four lots on this property. They have asked to put this land in reservation when the property is platted, and to be taken by the City at the appropriate time when the road is developed.
- <u>Dana Gill, 1044 Carlisle Lane, Franklin</u>: Asked the Board to amend this zoning to R-2, as discussed.
