2018 Transportation Alternatives Updates

- 2018 TAP funding must be authorized for construction on or before July 1, 2021 or the funds will be automatically withdrawn by FHWA. No contract extensions can be provided by TDOT to secure the funding.
- Undergrounding utilities outside the public right-of-way cannot be a stand-alone project: it must be a direct component
 of an eligible on-road or off-road trail facility for pedestrians, bicyclists and other non-motorized forms of transportation
 only, and is limited to 33% of eligible and reimbursable construction costs. Utilities affected within the public right-ofway must relocate at no cost to the project.
- All applications must include both an appropriate indoor and outdoor location for award announcement if the project is selected for funding.
- All TAP projects, regardless of scope or complexity, must be designed per TDOT Standards for Roadway Design and Bridge Construction and be submitted in the required TDOT format and all detectable warning systems/truncated domes must be universal safety yellow only.
- All bicycle and pedestrian facilities must be hard-surfaced, ADA compliant and provide adequate linear connectivity to
 existing facilities. Funding may not be used for spot improvements, repairs or maintenance and all new construction
 for multi-modal (shared use) facilities must be a minimum of 12-feet wide.
- All local governmental agencies, including those within the Chattanooga, Knoxville, Memphis and Nashville MPO/TPO's, may submit an application to the State Competitive Program. Please contact your MPO/TPO for additional information and specific guidelines regarding their regional competitive program schedule.
- Applicants with an outstanding uncommitted STP balance or MPO TAP allocation are advised to utilize such funds in lieu of submitting a TA application through the state competitive program.
- Per the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990, legislation prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability. Other Federal laws which affect the design, construction, alteration, and operation of federally-funded facilities include the Architectural Barriers Act of 1968 (ABA), and the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. Newly constructed and altered facilities covered by Titles II and III of the ADA, including all Transportation Alternatives-type projects, must be readily accessible to and usable by people with disabilities per the Public Rights-of-Way Accessibility Guidelines (PROWAG).
- The 20% non-federal construction share of the proposed project must be provided as a hard cash match, and all
 preliminary engineering (PE), design and right-of-way expenditures are solely the responsibility of the local
 governmental agency.
- Prior to submitting a 2018 application, all applicants must hold a design public involvement meeting to notify the local community of the intended project scope. You must include the date(s) and time(s) of public meetings that were held as well as the sign-in sheet, the record of all public comments received and the disposition of said comments with the completed application.
- Costs associated with application preparation and design public involvement meeting are not eligible for federal reimbursement.
- All line items listed in the application budget are subject to TDOT review and eligibility verification. Ineligible items will be excluded from federal reimbursement but may be included at the local agency's expense.
- If the proposed application is selected for project funding, only the specific description and approved budget items will be eligible for construction. The Transportation Alternatives (TA) funding will not be transferable nor will the project be eligible for major project scope changes. All remaining federal funds will revert to TDOT for re-distribution in the next funding cycle.
- Applications and proposed design plans selected for award have not been fully vetted, reviewed or approved by TDOT and may require further modification.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION:

The 20% non-federal construction share of the proposed project must be provided as a hard cash match, and all preliminary engineering (PE), design and right-of-way expenditures are solely the responsibility of the local governmental agency.

No add alternates or deductions will be allowed in the final construction cost estimate or bid documents.







APPENDIX B – PROJECT DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE & NEED





PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Harlinsdale Farm Multi-Use Path is proposed to begin on the west side of the Harpeth River near the Chestnut Bend Subdivision. The path will connect the existing Ruby F. Lynch trail system to a trailhead parking lot within The Park at Harlinsdale Farm. Beginning at the existing Ruby F. Lynch trail, the project proposes to construct approximately 500 LF of 12' wide, ADA accessible multi-use path to the Harpeth River. The trail will then cross the Harpeth via a proposed 3-span, 260 LF pedestrian bridge. On the east banks of the Harpeth River, the 12' wide multi-use trail will continue approximately 1,530 LF to the designated trailhead location within the park.

PURPOSE AND NEED

The primary purpose of this project is to construct a key portion of an ADA accessible, multi-use trail that will ultimately connect the northeast and northwest sides of the city with the downtown historic district. A secondary purpose of this project is to establish a trail to link the existing trail infrastructure (the Ruby F. Lynch Trail) with The Park at Harlinsdale Farm.

Currently, on the north side of Downtown Franklin there are no safe, non-motorized, ADA accessible transportation alternatives to connect the area northeast of Downtown Franklin with the area to the northwest or to access the National Historic Site of The Park at Harlinsdale Farm. The city is currently pursuing the development of a network of trails that will connect State Route 96W with the Hillsboro Road corridor, Bicentennial Park, and the Downtown Franklin network. However, heading north along Franklin Road after you cross the Harpeth River, sidewalks are non-existent and shoulders along the road are located in limited areas and would be a dangerous route for travelers on bicycle or foot, especially those with disabilities. To date, the aforementioned routes on the northwest side do not connect to routes on the northeast side of downtown (i.e. sidewalks along Liberty Pike and the trail along Mack Hatcher Parkway). This proposed multi-use trail at The Park at Harlinsdale Farm is viewed by the City as the catalyst to that connection.

Improving non-motorized connectivity is part of the City's overall vision to promote community and economic development while providing access for all individuals. As previously mentioned, the immediate outcome of the project will provide connectivity between existing multiuse trails that connect the Williamson County Recreation Center to Franklin High School, the Chestnut Bend Subdivision, Bicentennial Park, and Hillsboro Road with The Park at Harlinsdale



Farm. Not only does the Park provide access to 200 acres of rolling farmland, a dog park, and a catch and release fishing pond, but as part of their master plan the City plans to further develop this historic area by building an Equestrian Center and Museum. This park also serves as host for large festivals such as the Pilgrimage Music and Cultural Fest, and the Great Americana BBQ Festival. This will allow an alternate route for residents to safely walk from Downtown Franklin and established neighborhoods to the Park and back. Currently the City hosts approximately 5-10 large events at the Park and plans to encourage more community events to relocate from the historic downtown area to this facility. The Pilgrimage Music and Cultural Fest has historically attracted crowds as big as 20,000 – 30,000 people.

The City understands that by providing this multimodal, ADA accessible trail, more vehicular traffic will be redistributed and congestion on Hillsboro Road, Franklin Road, and other portions of the City's arterial roadway network will be reduced, especially during large events in Franklin or The Park at Harlinsdale Farm. The City of Franklin is the seventh largest and the fastest growing city in the State of Tennessee with approximately 71,374 people in 2017 up from 66,335 people in 2014. The City is expected to continue this fast-paced growth over the near and long-term future with a projected population of approximately 134,000 people in 2040. Based on these projections, the City is actively working to update all of their transportation facilities and the project location is one area where the City foresees a large benefit.

Ultimately, the City envisions this trail as an integral part of their proposed network to provide uninterrupted and ADA accessible pedestrian and bikeway access that connects the City within the loop of Mack Hatcher Parkway. In 2016 the City of Franklin adopted a Comprehensive Transportation Network Plan and a Greenway and Trails Master Plan. Both plans highlight the need to improve connectivity and incorporate alternative means of transportation throughout the City and with adjoining agencies. The Comprehensive Transportation Network Plan (http://www.franklin-gov.com/home/showdocument?id=24922) focuses on providing sidewalks, bike lanes and trails alongside roadways while the Greenway and Trails Master Plan (http://www.franklin-gov.com/home/showdocument?id=1255) focuses on providing connectivity in areas outside of the public right-of-way. Both plans are well coordinated to ensure that the City can provide long-term feasible alternative modes of transportation, that are ADA accessible, throughout the City. The City is well aware that alternative transportation modes will be an essential and integral part of Franklin's future transportation system.

City holds meeting to discuss construction of Harlinsdale Park multi-use trail and bridge

Franklin city officials sought public opinions Monday night on a multi-use trail that would connect Harlinsdale Park with other local parks owned by the city.

As they prepare to submit a grant request on Oct. 3, Franklin leaders held a public meeting asking for questions and comments to be turned in on comment cards regarding the trail and bridge, which would span the Harpeth River.

The path would connect the northeast and northwest parts of the city with an ADA accessible path, Alfred Benesch & Co., project engineer, Brian Ralstin said.

Ralstin and city officials stressed the importance of connectivity for foot traffic, noting the projected town population of 71,000 people. They also emphasized the projected growth by the year 2040 to be 134,000 residents.

"The great joke is, how do you eat an elephant?" Ralstin questioned in reference to the project. "Well, it's one bite at a time. This is what we're doing, we're taking that one bite out."

The first step is to apply for a federal grant, which the city will receive notice of by June of 2018. Then, the city will need to find a design consultant and do preliminary engineering.

The total cost of the project is estimated at \$3 million. City engineer, Jonathan Marston said he expects no more than \$1 million in grants if the city were to receive federal funding.

The trail, Ralstin said, will go behind the Chestnut Bend neighborhood, along the river running north, and will connect with the Harlinsdale Park parking lot.

"Because everybody is so tied to the automobile, it makes it hard to get around," Franklin Parks Director, Lisa Clayton said. "But if you are wanting to visit or go to an event and traffic's an issue on a day to day basis, you want to be able to walk to it."

Clayton said the city had trail systems within subdivisions and parks, but had yet to connect the dots.

"The Harpeth River is really that spine that connects us all," she said.

Linda McCarty, who lives in a neighborhood across from The Factory, clapped when she heard that there were plans to create a walkway to Downtown Franklin.

"To be able to hook up the west side to the east side is pretty remarkable," she said. "The one thing we wanted to do when we came down town was we wanted to be able to be able to walk everywhere."

McCarty said the idea that the path would be ADA-friendly especially appealed to her after she broke her femur several months ago; she traveled from her home to the Pilgrimage Music Festival the past weekend in a motor scooter.

"That was not gonna stop me!" she laughed. "For it to be ADA accessible, I really respect that and appreciate that."

"Creating those accesses and becoming more vocal, that's one of the things that I see as a very positive sign," echoed Clayton of creating a handicap accessible pathway.

Clayton said the project has been in the parks master plan for a while, but not at the top of the list.

"It's not just about connecting parks to parks, it's about connecting people to destinations. That's what this bridge project will do."

Thomas Ellis, President of the Chestnut Bend Board, expressed his support for the project in an email. Clayton said she had heard, "nothing negative toward this project as of yet."

McCarty said she might have some concerns as officials continue with the project, but was confident city officials would listen to their constituents as the project gets underway.

"It seems that we have so many good leaders in Franklin that make sure things are done right," she said. "I'm not as concerned as I would be in some places."

At a public meeting on Monday night, city engineering staff and consultants announced the

move to apply for the grant that would help pay for the project from the Tennessee Department of Transportation.

"There's not a safe way or ADA compliant way to connect the northwest and northeast sides of the community," project consultant Brian Ralstin said. "There are number of projects funded for trails on Highway 96, along with the trails on the future Mack Hatcher. We want to connect these projects with the other part of the community."

The connection would happen at the back of Harlinsdale Farm with new trails on either side to provide new access to existing paths. According to Ralstin, the project could total up to \$3 million.

Both the engineers and consultant team said they will file the application by the Oct. 3 deadline. At this point in the project planning, there is no design for exactly where the trail will go.

"The city knows that to get people connected you have to have more than vehicular traffic," Ralstin said. "It's important to this community, and why we are going out for the project. This is an essential connection point here at the farm."


If awarded, the City of Franklin could move forward with more concrete plans as soon as June 2018.

Franklin vies for state trails grant, steps closer to better pedestrian connectivity

A new connectivity project, which is part of the city's Parks Master Plan, could make The Park at Harlinsdale Farm a bit more accessible for walkers and bikers in Franklin.

"How do you eat an elephant? One bite at a time," Brian Ralstin, a project engineer with the firm Alfred Benesch & Company said at a recent community meeting this week about the downtown connectivity project.

The city of Franklin is in the running to secure a Tennessee Department of Transportation grant, possibly up to \$1 million, that would bring a multi-use paved trail to connect downtown Franklin from the Chestnut Bend neighborhood to Harlinsdale Farm. The trail would also provide access from Harlinsdale to Bicentennial Park for better downtown pedestrian access.

Friends of Franklin Parks Executive Director Torrey Barnhill was among the dozen spectators at the community meeting Monday at Franklin City Hall.

"This project will connect two parks and a school, and this is the first step in connecting Bicentennial Park to Harlinsdale," Barnhill said. "Our goal is to connect parks, and we are very excited about this step."

The 12-foot trail would meet the requirements of accessibility under the American Disabilities Act (ADA), which is required in order for the city to qualify for the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) state grant.

The 12-foot trail would stretch from an existing 10-foot paved path in the Chestnut Bend subdivision to a parking lot near the recently constructed dog park at Harlinsdale Farm. The project would include an ADA-approved bridge over the Harpeth River, connecting both properties along the path.

The community meeting comes on the heels of the third annual Pilgrimage Music & Cultural Festival last weekend in which many walked, biked and even canoed to the two-day festival at Harlinsdale Farm.

"[The advent of the Pilgrimage Festival in Franklin] is another big purpose is to make that connection," Ralstin said.

"There is currently not a way to access the south and northwest part of the community. This is another way to get to Harlinsdale."

The project is part of the long-term city Parks connectivity plan that includes incorporating more opportunities for more connectivity for pedestrians and walkers by connecting parks and green spaces in Franklin.

Pilgrimage Music & Cultural Festival co-founder Kevin Griffin was inspired using the trail system at Harlinsdale Farm a few years ago when he got a burst of inspiration for a music festival while running and seeing the beauty of the sun shining down on Harlinsdale Farm. The festival just completed its third successful year of bringing musical talent to Franklin.

However, the proposed trail project would take about six months to design before construction begins, said city engineer Jonathan Marston.

If the city of Franklin is not awarded the grant, however, Marston assured attendees that the project will go on.
